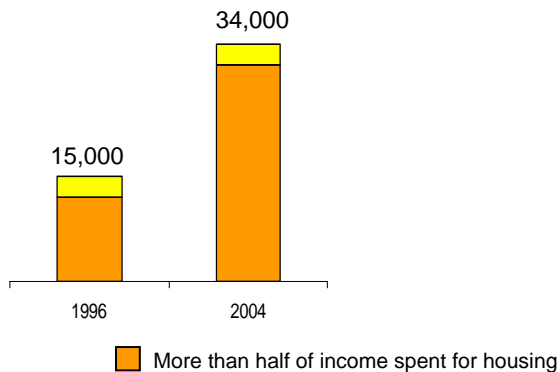




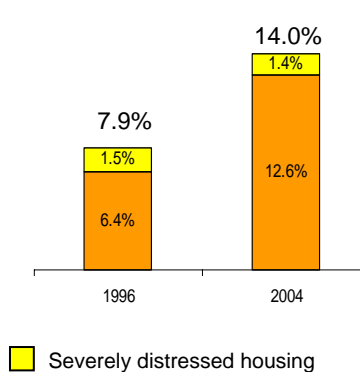
# Housing Challenges Facing Working Families in the Sacramento, CA Metropolitan Area

**The Number of Working Families with Critical Housing Needs in the Sacramento Area Increased Substantially from 1996 to 2004. The Rate of Housing Problems Among Working Families Also Rose.**

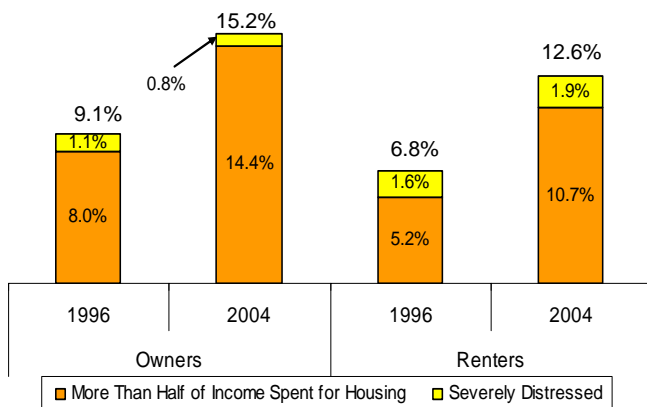
Number with Critical Housing Needs

## Sacramento Compared to Other Metros

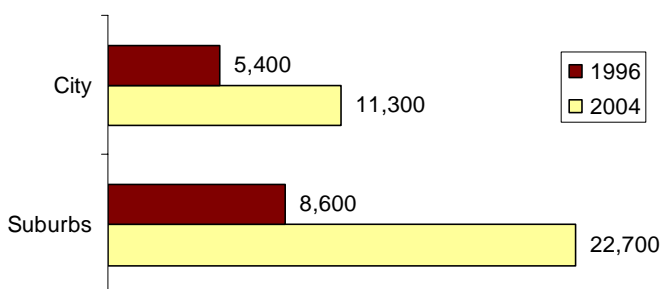
-- In 2004, 13.9% of working families had critical housing needs, above the national rate of 13.1% in 2005.

-- Sacramento is tied with Denver and San Bernardino for the 7<sup>th</sup> highest incidence of critical housing needs among working families of the 31 areas studied.

### Definitions:

**Working families** are those who work the equivalent of a full-time job and earn at least the annual federal minimum wage (\$10,712 in 2004) but no more than 120 percent of the area median income.

**Critical housing needs** are defined as living in severely distressed housing and/or spending more than half of household income on housing.

The **Sacramento metropolitan area** is defined as El Dorado, Placer and Sacramento Counties, CA, according to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The Sacramento **area median income** in 2004 was \$64,100.

## Portrait of Sacramento Working Families with Critical Housing Needs, 2004

### The majority rely on just one wage earner.

- 1 wage earner: 60.9%
- 2 wage earners: 29.6%
- 3 or more wage earners: 9.4%

### They are more likely to be homeowners than renters.

- Owners: 55.4%
- Renters: 44.6%

### They are more likely to have children than other Sacramento households.

### They are more likely to be racial or ethnic minorities than the overall population of Sacramento.

### They often have very low incomes.

- 56.2 percent have incomes less than 50% of area median (\$10,712 to \$32,050).
- 28.7 percent have incomes between 51% and 80% of area median (\$32,051 to \$51,280).
- 15.3 percent have incomes between 81% and 120% of area median (\$51,281 to \$76,920).

Compared to working families without critical housing needs, those with critical needs have, in general, both lower incomes and higher housing costs.

<sup>2</sup> For the general population of Sacramento, Hispanics may fall within both the Hispanic category and the Other category; therefore, these percentages do not add up to 100 percent.
