Dear Representative Velazquez,

The undersigned organizations thank you for introducing H.R. 480, "Housing America's Workforce Act." This bill would allow working families to maximize the full value of housing assistance provided by an employer and would create a tax incentive for employers encouraging them to offer housing assistance programs.

In many communities, the cost of housing has outpaced the growth of wages. In 2013, more than 21 percent of working households spent more than half of their income on housing—that is 9.6 million households. This mismatch has created a gap in the number of families who need affordable housing and the number of opportunities available. Employer-assisted housing programs—including downpayment assistance, interest rate buy-downs, rental assistance, and closing cost grants—could help bridge this gap.

Current law requires employees to report housing assistance received from an employer as taxable income. Changing this law by providing both employees and their employers with favorable tax treatment for housing assistance could help working families secure affordable housing opportunities--as renters or owners--in the communities where they work. In addition, studies also show that these programs can help employers recruit and retain high-quality employees.<sup>2</sup>

Employer-assisted housing is only a part of the solution for our nation's changing housing needs, but it is a tool with the potential to create meaningful benefits for working families and employers.
